The Connectional System

One of the wonders of the United Methodist Church is our connectionalism. We can think of our vertical integration from church to district to annual conference to jurisdiction to the national church. We can think of our horizontal connections of districts and annual conferences working together, resourced by United Methodist Church agencies. We value these relationships through structures. Another perspective on connectionalism is linking resources with needs. The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) provides monetary resources; United Methodist Volunteers in Mission (UMVIM) provides the boots on the ground.

In disaster relief, the Early Response Teams arrive after local authorities determine the scene is safe. Some people do site research and suitability, others arrive with skills for short term relief, getting the tasks done while working on relationships. Then long term United Methodist Volunteers in Mission teams assist with labor and supplies for the long haul.

Back in the early 1990s, the Akron Canton Regional Foodbank had a walk-in freezer malfunction and needed to move 1500 half gallon boxes of ice cream. One of the calls they made was to Canton Calvary UMC which had a small food pantry (serving 65-70 families), and which also had partnerships with an AIDS Hospice, a few senior citizen housing complexes, and day care centers. A pick up truck loaded with 300 half gallons arrived in Canton just before noon, and within an hour those 300 boxes of ice cream were in the freezers of non-profits. The connections of the UMC helped solve a problem.

UMC relief work has many facets including: Youth Work Missions doing housing rehab, churches collecting disaster relief supplies co-ordinated through Midwest Mission Distribution Center or Sager Brown (supply depots and affiliated warehouses), NOMADS traveling state to state working on long term projects and annual conference sponsored medical missions to places like Progresso Nuevo, Mexico. Or it could be something small like donating boxes of unneeded dishes and kitchen utensils to a re-entry ministry in Dover, Ohio assisting women leaving shelters.

Our own Cloverleaf Collaborative is an example of connectionalism, demonstrating we can do more together than we can do separately. The challenge came from East Ohio Annual Conference to form some 'fresh expressions' where worship and bible study happen outside the church walls, and the Cloverleaf Collaborative received a start up grant for Bibles and Burritos (held at El Patron the second Wednesday of the month).

Paul's metaphor was parts of the body (see 1 Corinthians 12 and Romans 12). I think of the phone operator at the PBX board connecting a number of inside lines with calls outside the network. Connectionalism is one of the blessings the UMC shares with the world.

There is one body, but it has many parts. But all its many parts make up one body.



What's happening to support the people of Lahaina?

Wind-driven wildfires on Maui have prompted evacuations and caused significant loss of life and widespread damage. **UMCOR** is coordinating with the California-Pacific Annual Conference to process an initial grant for emergency supplies such as shelf-stable food, water, hygiene items and tools to help survivors recover belongings.

Midwest Mission is partnering with agencies on Maui to determine what supplies are needed. Many items are being

sent without concern for what is actually needed. This toxic charity creates a secondary disaster since agencies will have to find a way to manage things that are not useful.

What can you do? Add "Hawaii" to the memo of your check or on your giving envelope to share in this support for our neighbors in Lahaina. Watch for the list of needs as Midwest Mission shares this information.

The first **sleeping mat** is completed! Stop by the Fellowship Hall to cut bags, tie bags, or do a bit of weaving. We will connect with agencies in Medina County that work with our homeless neighbors to help distribute the mats.

Last April, we completed a **Rice Meal Pack** that provided meals for 7200 people in Turkey. We have another Rice Meal Pack planned for **Saturday, September 9 beginning at 9:00 am.** We will pack 1200 meals. Each bag is \$2.00. (We are sharing the truck with another church which reduced our cost to just the product.)









And a Food Pantry update- In August, we served 24 families. In addition to your donations and the product shared by our neighbors, we picked up 664 pounds of food from the Akron Canton Food Bank. Thank you for your continued generosity!

On Hospitality *Emily Gladden*

When I stepped into the office administrator role here at our church, my learning curve was eased by some foundational knowledge; if I get a phone call about the food pantry, if the boiler isn't working, if a group meeting in the building wants to present on the screens, or if I have a question about flower orders or filing committee minutes, I know where to turn for support!

This adjustment would have been much more difficult if instead of simply learning my responsibilities I also had to learn our church's entire structure, both formal and informal, from scratch. Imagine just how at-sea a newcomer to our church would feel, surrounded by a network that's both obscure and unfamiliar. When you're new, everyone and everything is a mystery to you.

A key part of our Lighthouse Training session focused on the importance of **demystifying.** Our speaker broke this down into three categories: secret identities, code language, and secret handshakes.

First, **secret identities:** who are all these people?

We tend to take for granted that, when someone stands up to speak during worship, we know who they are. Simple introductions that may seem redundant to us could go a long way for someone who walked into our church knowing no names and faces. Introductions allow a visitor to start building a personal network in our church and avoid missing important points of connection. How much easier is it to find a sense of community when someone making an announcement says, "and I'm part of our men's group/I'm involved with Sunday School, etc."? This could be especially important to consider for someone worshiping virtually, who is in danger of seeing only the backs of heads and hearing a few distant, disembodied voices. How can we be sure these people feel connection?

Code language (what we say) and secret handshakes (what we do) are commonplace in worship; I'm sure many of us find comfort in ritual and tradition. But we all had to learn the lingo at some point. There are three groups of worshipers: the committed, the disconnected, and the seekers. We need to be sure that everything makes sense to this third group, people who could land in our worship service by happenstance. It isn't difficult to think up a list of words and rituals that could confuse someone new to church: doxology, liturgist, acolyte, benediction, Eucharist, narthex, parlor. When it comes to offering, communion, or the sharing of prayer concerns and celebrations, should we really be operating under the assumption that everyone knows what's going on or can intuit how they should participate?



Struggling with an unfamiliar environment will tax the mental and emotional energy of our visitors. Alleviating this burden is a valuable hospitality goal, and one we should reaffirm our commitment to.
