#### A WORD FROM OUR REVEREND...

#### Reverend Donald Kuntz

#### The Season of Advent has many functions and facets.

How are we preparing for God's entrance in the world? How are we alert to where God is already moving and acting in pregnant moments? How are we being better innkeepers?

Advent's color is purple, reminding us that our sins get in the way of our relationship with God, and we are not ready for God's arrival.

Early in our faith, Advent is experienced as a countdown to Christmas, a learning tool for patience and focus. We must wait to receive. Pregnancy is about patience. Today patience is out of style, and focus is derided in favor of multi-taking.

Later in our faith development, Advent is experienced as a time of preparation, engaging the believer in bringing others into the faith story, a teaching tool about those who say 'yes' (Mary, the innkeeper, the shepherds, Joseph, Zachariah, John the Baptizer). The angels do as instructed and bring good news to the field shepherds whose imagination is sparked to go visit Mary who said yes to God's outrageous plan months ago.

Later in our faith development, Advent is experienced as a way to look to the future, not the past. Believers engage in those Psalm 23 behaviors, ushering people to quiet pastures, to peaceful waters, to paths of righteousness; providing companionship in difficult times, tables of abundance, practices of goodness and mercy; leading to greater participation in the house of the Lord. The Old Testament prophets taught an expectation that people of faith would be involved in the repair of the world — bringing justice, righteousness, and peace.

I encourage you to include patience in your yuletide celebration. Perhaps look at the old tradition of the 12 days of Christmas from December 25 to January 6 (Epiphany- when the kings show up). In some families, Christmas trees are down before New Year's, before the Magi even arrive. I encourage you to discern which practices point to the story and which practices point elsewhere. Are we allowing consumerism to get the best of us? Are we bowing down to something other than a baby in a manger?

Advent is about watching and waiting, observing how God is at work in the world making things better, making repairs; and how we partner with God in that work, for the sake of a helpless infant who becomes our King.

Be patient, therefore, beloved, until the coming of the Lord.

The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it.

You also must be patient. (James 5:7-8)

## **The Church in Mission**

I want to express my gratitude to everyone who has had a role in making the sleeping mats for the homeless and/or to those who have offered their time and help to make the UMC Food Pantry a success.

Your efforts are making a difference!

**Sleeping Mats:** The first four mats went to Cups Cafe in Medina. I stopped by and took one in to see if they could distribute them. As soon as I walked in with the mat, one of the gentlemen nudged the volunteer and said, "I used to have one of those! Remember? When I lived in my tent." They took all four mats. And they knew exactly who would receive these mats.

One mat is at the altar gathering up your prayers for the person who will receive it. Each line of *plarn* woven into the mat becomes a bit of warmth, a bit of comfort, a bit of hope for employment, a roof, and a meal. It may not seem like much, cutting and tying plastic grocery bags, but it is huge for the person receiving the mat.

Something to know about the mats: Each 6-foot-by- $2\frac{1}{2}$ -foot mat is made from about 600 to 900 recycled plastic grocery bags and a mat can take up to 35 to 50 hours to complete. There are two ways you can participate in making Sleeping Mats:



- 1. Make Plarn: We need people to make the plarn used in the sleeping mats. Collect plastic grocery bags, cut them following the video below, and bring them to church.
- 2. Make the Sleeping Mats: We have a loom at the church to weave these Sleeping Mats together. Feel free to contact Rev. Tammy if you can collect more plarn or grocery bags, and have interest in using the loom before/after the church service, or during the week.

Thank you to Carl and Kristi for painting, removing the carpet, and cleaning the floor. The November volunteers helped move everything. A new-to-us freezer and new-to-us refrigerator were donated and are in place. Organization is slow, but it will be ready!

The administrative assistants who will not be continuing with the Conference will remain in their current roles until January 31, 2024.

#### **December 3, 2023 will be Scholarship Sunday:**

Churches are invited to partner with the United Methodist Higher Education Foundation (UMHEF) to make it more affordable for Methodist students to attend United Methodist Colleges, Universities and Seminaries. The foundation's UM Dollars for Scholars is a popular matching-fund program that makes this possible.

Our church offers support to a student with \$1,000 (on a church check sent directly to UMHEF after the student has applied). UMHEF matches that for a total of \$2,000. Participating United Methodist-related schools may match with up to \$1,000. For United Methodist applicants, participating UMC Conference Foundations may match up to \$1,000 as well. Your UM Dollars for Scholars scholarship may total up to \$4,000. The United Methodist Higher Education Foundation is a private non-profit 501(c)3 organization that awards \$2+ million annually to United Methodists and other students attending UM-related schools. Prayerfully consider how you might be able to help the youth of our congregation for years to come.




## **November Finance**

I have seen her work first- hand and her collaboration as she prepares the newsletter and bulletins with great care. I appreciate her time in teaching me the key elements in this role. You provide stability, rationale and I rely on your strength, your example. I am like the harsh ocean waves hitting against the rock, but the rock stands firm. You are the rock. You provide what others don't see peace, security and someone who shares my vision."

This poem also reminds me of how I chose to live my life as I trust in the Lord to be present in my life, even if others don't see him. We find comfort in surrounding ourselves with those who support us and express love towards us. However, at the end of the day, we need to remember that it is our faith that keeps us strong and keeps us together as we ride through the waves of life.

Today, I share my time at home with my two dogs (Bartley & Henry) and my cat Zeke. I also spend time in the community as a volunteer using my creative and interpersonal gifts to serve others as I support projects that I believe in like the Parkinson's Group, the N.E. Ohio Gabriel Project and a recent endeavor working with Advantage Aging and Mac's Pawsitive Pals (as they support the needs of the elderly and their pets). After Dan's passing, it didn't take long for me to realize where God was instructing me to turn. I made new connections and planted new seeds for community programs that would benefit others. That said, my work is not always a clear path. I do experience harsh struggles at times, but I am reminded that I am not alone. "Alone we can do so little, together we can do so much!"

I currently facilitate the Wayne County Parkinson's Group (PD). This group has flourished since 2017. Growing up with a father that had Multiple Sclerosis (MS) the transition to facilitator of this group was fairly easy since M.S. and P.D. are similar in their neurological symptoms. Our group has formed strong bonds over time, we've shed many tears over the loss of loved ones and shared in laughter as we talked about our life stories, our heartaches, and victories. We could not experience this journey **without** these connections to one another. We are a family!

Audrey Hepburn said, "As you grow older you discover that you have two hands, one for helping yourself and one for helping others." I believe that we are all called to help in some way whether it is through our talents, our financial contributions, or in other ways that we can serve. I am glad that I have been called to be a part of this family/community now. Our PD group meets on Fridays at First Presbyterian church in Wooster for the "Move with Me" program. This program involves movement to music in order to support better balance and stability for those dealing with Parkinson's. As I watched members at past events, I saw how the group became engaged in conversation and laughter as they had fun. For that moment in time, no one was aware of life's problems or the fact that they had a disease. This program was created with that notion in mind and is a platform for fellowship, support, and love. I enjoy this class just as much as the participants each week.

Prior to becoming an advocate for those managing Parkinson's, I served as executive chair on the State of Ohio FASD Board as an advocate educating others about the dangers of alcohol during pregnancy (Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder or FASD). Also, at this time I became a foster parent and served for five years helping families. I soon realized that there was a different approach that I should consider when I saw a banner sign outside of St. Mary's church in Wooster. I called the 800 number that was on the sign and I had a long conversation with Mary Wood, the project supervisor. In 2013, I joined the Gabriel Project focused on the efforts of the church in supporting the needs of pregnant woman and their families who are at risk. Over time, as I engaged with these young women, I learned that many of these women did not have a connection to faith and many did not have the presence of a mother or grandmother in their life. In my early years, my mother, father, and grandparents, as well as my faith guided me on life's path. Without these constructs in place, these women were lacking guidance and support. As advocates our emphasis was to provide direction to help women access community resources empowering them to make better life choices; and in turn becoming better prepared as young parents. I am still involved with the N.E. Gabriel Project, however now as a consultative educator teaching the program to other churches within the Catholic Diocese alongside Mary, my supervisor.


